Course Introduction

The **Diploma in Theology and Biblical Studies (Dip.TBS)** is a comprehensive Level 4 qualification designed to equip students with foundational knowledge in theological doctrines, biblical literature, and Christian ministry. Offered by the Diversity Learning Institute (DLI) Germany in collaboration with CIU Germany, this 12-month program is structured over two semesters, providing 120 credits (60 credits per semester). Through academic inquiry, spiritual reflection, and practical ministry training, this course prepares students for roles in Christian leadership, evangelism, and ministry while fostering personal spiritual growth and deepening their understanding of biblical theology.

- 4. **Equip for Evangelism and Ministry**: Prepare students for effective Christian ministry by imparting practical skills in evangelism, leadership, and pastoral care.
- 5. **Cultivate Critical Thinking and Analysis**: Develop the ability to critically engage with theological writings and contemporary issues in Christianity using a biblical framework.
- 6. **Enhance Communication and Teaching Skills**: Enable students to effectively communicate biblical truths and theological concepts to diverse audiences, both in written and spoken forms.
- 7. **Integrate Faith with Everyday Life**: Encourage the integration of faith with personal, social, and cultural contexts to live out Christian values and mission.

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LEARNING METHOD CONTACT DISTANCE LEARNING(CDL)

Here's a detailed table outlining the structure of how the Contact Distance Learning (CDL) program by Diversity Learning Institute (DLI) Germany in partnership with Central International University (CIU) Germany might be organized, along with additional procedures necessary for effective Contact Distance Learning(CDL):

Phase	Description	Timing	Key Activities
1. Course Enrollment	Students register for courses based on their program through an online portal.	Prior to the start of the course	Online application, submission of required documents, payment of tuition fees, and access to course materials.
